Program Overview

This career-focused diploma develops practical and theoretical knowledge across the full supply-chain cycle. Learners examine operations, procurement, inventory, demand planning, warehousing, transportation, information systems, contracting and international business trends.

What You Will Learn

- Understand how effective supply chains operate in diverse global markets.
- Apply inventory, warehousing, transportation and demand-forecasting concepts.
- Use business technology and management information systems to support decisions.
- Develop communication, negotiation, contracting and project-management skills.
- Connect each role to the broader end-to-end supply-chain cycle.

Delivery Model

The program combines approximately 962 hours of instructor-led learning with a 320-hour supervised practicum. The published schedule is 20 hours per week. Classroom, hybrid or online components and exact attendance requirements must be confirmed for the applicable intake.

Expected Salary Range

Alberta logistics coordinator wages: approximately \$22.32 to \$54.99 per hour, with a reported median of about \$34.61 per hour (Government of Canada Job Bank wage data).

Admission Requirements

- Canadian high-school graduation or equivalent; or mature-student status.
- Successful entrance assessment and admissions interview.
- Additional documentation may be requested during admissions.

English-Language Assessment & College Interview

Applicants must successfully complete the institution's admissions process, which may include an entrance assessment and an admissions interview. Where English is not the applicant's first language or prior education was



completed outside Canada, proof of English-language proficiency may be required. The interview may be used to confirm the applicant's communication ability and readiness for the program. Final requirements must be confirmed before enrolment.

Practicum / Work Experience

A 320-hour supervised placement is intended to help students apply classroom learning in a real workplace and gain relevant experience.
